Emergency Response

Delivering urgent relief when it matters most

Catastrophic earthquakes struck Türkiye, Syria, and Morocco this year, leaving millions of people in need without access to care. Project HOPE mobilized partners to support relief efforts in the affected areas that included search and rescue operations, hygiene kits, incubators, sleeping bags, mobility devices, clean water, mobile medical units, mental health support, and housing for health workers who lost their homes. Our teams also provided urgent relief in areas experiencing violent conflict, including Israel, Gaza, Armenia, as well as Sudan, where Project HOPE helped deliver 24,000 pounds of medical supplies, pharmaceuticals, hygiene supplies, and therapeutic food to support Sudanese hospitals and health facilities in need.

Humanitarian Assistance

Providing support to strengthen health systems facing crises



Project HOPE's response to the war in Ukraine has now reached more than 1 million people

Project HOPE's humanitarian assistance work helped millions of people facing crises improve their access to primary and mental health care in 2023, including programming in Ukraine, Poland, Moldova, Ethiopia, Nigeria, and Colombia. In Haiti, where health systems have struggled under the weight of the country's complex humanitarian crisis, Project HOPE implemented a multi-sectoral response that included mobile medical units, health worker trainings, hygiene kit distributions, pharmaceuticals, medical supplies, hospital infrastructure repairs, mental health programming, and more.
