Situation Overview

As the war in Ukraine continues to escalate, people in Ukraine are facing the acute impacts of prolonged conflict. Escalated attacks are killing and injuring civilians, including a **devastating strike on Ukraine's largest children's hospital**. In addition, airstrikes continue to damage homes, hospitals, schools, energy facilities, and essential infrastructure. In light of these realities, people in front-line communities are being forced to move within and outside the country to find **safety and stability for their families**.

Since February 2022, there have been 1,911 verified attacks on Ukraine's health system, including attacks on health infrastructure, patients receiving care, medical transportation, supplies, and health workers. The World Health Organization highlights that the situation is especially grave in areas near the front lines or those recently reclaimed by the Ukrainian government. Almost half of the health facilities in eastern and southern Ukraine — in Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, Mykolaiv, Kherson and Kharkiv oblasts — are either partially or completely non-functional. People who remain in these regions, including older adults, people with limited mobility, and people with disabilities, have complex health care needs that the current health system is struggling to address.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS



Since the conflict erupted in 2022, around <u>6.6 million</u> Ukrainians have become refugees and <u>3.5 million</u> Ukrainians have been internally displaced. More than <u>953,000</u> Ukrainian refugees are recorded in Poland and over <u>123,000</u> are living in Moldova.



Our team in Ukraine continues to focus on providing critical support to conflict-affected communities near the front lines in eastern and southern Ukraine, where individuals are often without access to primary health, WASH, and MHPSS services.



Project HOPE teams in Poland and Moldova continue to address gaps in essential services, including primary health, MHPSS, and protection services for refugees and host community members.

In response, Project HOPE's team in Ukraine is delivering humanitarian aid and essential services, focusing on the needs of front-line communities. Additionally, our regional team is supporting the primary health and mental health needs of Ukrainian refugees in Poland and Moldova.

PROJECT HOPE'S RESPONSE

Project HOPE continues to implement a highly coordinated, comprehensive humanitarian intervention in Ukraine and the neighboring countries of Moldova and Poland. **In Ukraine**, Project HOPE's humanitarian assistance focuses on supporting local primary and secondary health facilities with essential medicine, medical supplies, and equipment, as well as reconstruction projects. Project HOPE is also addressing mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS); protection; water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH); and winterization needs to improve humanitarian conditions for those most affected by this crisis.

In Moldova and Poland, the team is working to address gaps in essential services for refugees and selected host communities, including primary health, MHPSS, and protection services. In all areas of our response, Project HOPE works closely with government officials, local partners, and coordination clusters (groups of humanitarian organizations coordinating relief work across multiple sectors) to ensure that our efforts address the most pressing needs. The following pages outline the impact of our response activities to date.

Ukraine Update

- Provided humanitarian assistance to 436 facilities to date, including 345 health facilities, 11 centers for internally displaced people (IDPs), 59 local administrations, and 21 non-governmental organizations in 23 oblasts — with 56,926 pharmaceutical items provided to 20 facilities across seven oblasts in the second quarter of 2024.
- Distributed over 88,132 winterization supplies and non-food items to date, including thermal clothes, electrical heaters, kettles, mattresses, pillows, blankets, bed linens, and solid fuel to 87 health and social service facilities.
- Delivered and installed 234 generators to date, strengthening the capacity of 128 facilities.
- Delivered nine ambulances to date for first responders in Kherson, Kharkiv, and Dnipro oblasts, supporting a total of 14,166 patient transportations to date and 4,038 transportations in the second quarter of 2024.
- Provided MHPSS services to 171,031 Ukrainians at four IDP centers, seven MHPSS sites established by Project HOPE, 31 hospitals, and through online consultations to date — reaching 18,878 participants in the second quarter of 2024.

Project HOPE has launched 49 mobile medical units (MMUs) to date that have provided 690,102 medical consultations (including 11,888 mental health consultations) to 392,222 patients in the Zaporizhzhia, Odesa, Mykolaiv, Kherson, Donetsk, and Kharkiv oblasts — with MMUs reaching 40,007 patients in the second quarter of 2024 through 136,730 consultations.

- Through surge staff, provided a total of 946,473 medical consultations to 416,523 patients in 35 health facilities across Ukraine to date reaching 70,766 patients in the second quarter of 2024 through 181,001 consultations.
- Provided gender-based violence response services to 38,988 people to date to protect survivors — reaching 3,767 participants in the second quarter of 2024.
- Distributed 152,365 hygiene kits and essential non-food items to cover the basic needs of 273,594 individuals to date with 6,344 family hygiene kits, 1,129 baby hygiene kits, and 211 individual hygiene kits delivered in the second quarter of 2024.
- Trained 10,190 health care workers to date from 87 health facilities on topics like European Pediatric Advanced Life Support, Trauma and Disaster Team Response, Psychological First Aid, Mental Health Gap, Basic Life Support, Infection Prevention and Control, WASH, Sexual and Gender-Based Violence, Medical Supply Chain, and nursing with 2,426 health workers trained in the second quarter of 2024
- In the second quarter of 2024, began reconstruction projects at
 Mykolaiv Regional Clinical Hospital and replaced doors and windows
 at Kherson Regional TB Dispensary. To date, Project HOPE has
 successfully reconstructed and reopened 12 health and social service
 facilities in Kyiv, Chernihiv, Kharkiv, and Kherson oblasts.
- Delivered **1,375,200 six-liter bottles of drinking water** to **12 health facilities** and community members in **35 settlements** to date with **68,352** six-liter bottles delivered to **6,286** Ukrainians in the second quarter of 2024.



Project HOPE has delivered **\$15.6** million of lifesaving medicines and medical supplies to health facilities across the country since the beginning of our response in 2022.

Moldova Update

- Launched two MMUs that have since provided 1,073 medical consultations (including 279 mental health consultations) to 590 patients to date in Stefan Vodă and Floreşti districts.
- Launched a health worker training program, with 48 health workers at 19 health facilities trained on Basic Life Support skills in the second quarter of 2024.



Project HOPE's new MMUs will significantly **improve health** care access in **Ștefan Vodă and Florești districts** and deliver essential pharmaceutical items to local communities and Ukrainian refugees.

Poland Update

- Launched two mobile MHPSS units to improve access to essential services at six shelters housing Ukrainian refugees. To date, these units have provided **167 mental health consultations** (74 individual and 93 group sessions) to 203 Ukrainian refugees, **59 social work sessions** to 41 Ukrainians, and 130 group social cohesion sessions.
- Procured and delivered 23 pieces of specialized medical equipment, including infusion pumps, cardiac monitors, rehabilitation equipment, and physiotherapy bathtubs to the **Physiotherapy and Blood Cell Transplantation** units at University Children's Hospital in Kraków.
- Procured and delivered **25 rehabilitation beds** to the Kraków Municipal Social Welfare Center to ensure access for those who would otherwise be unable to afford essential equipment.
- Procured and delivered **rehabilitation equipment**, including a rehabilitation table, standing frame and lift, balance platform, rehabilitation balls, and handrails to the Rehabilitation Center for Children with Advanced Disabilities in Lublin.
- Provided medical devices and hygiene supplies to two accommodation centers for refugees in Lublin that are currently hosting 464 Ukrainian refugees.
- Procured and delivered furniture, including beds, cribs, cabinets, chairs, mattresses, and educational toys to **nine children's nurseries** in Lublin.
- In coordination with the Institute of Psychology at Jagiellonian University in Kraków, Project HOPE developed a training program for school nurses and caregivers. An initial group of **10 school professionals** have been selected to start the training course in September 2024.
