Three Years of Humanitarian Response in Ukraine

As the full-scale invasion of Ukraine enters its fourth year, Project HOPE has evolved its initial emergency response into a comprehensive humanitarian intervention built to create lasting change. With a focus on supporting the most vulnerable populations in frontline regions, our team on the ground pairs our lifesaving assistance with sustainable development to build long-term resilience.

To ensure access to health care for civilians, Project HOPE has strengthened Ukraine's health system by equipping clinics with essential supplies, delivering lifesaving medicines, training health workers, incentivizing surge staff, supporting emergency transportation services, and deploying mobile medical units to communities on the front lines.

Project HOPE's humanitarian response stretches across all aspects of health, addressing critical gaps in services by reconstructing and repairing health and social facilities; providing mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) to internally displaced people (IDPs) and others affected by conflict; improving access to water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) supplies; and distributing essential items to help communities endure blackouts and harsh winter conditions.

Over the past three years, Project HOPE's programming has directly reached more than **1.85 million people** and provided continuous and comprehensive support to **108 health facilities**.

To further extend its reach, Project HOPE has established **eight regional hubs** across Ukraine to support the needs of frontline communities, as well as **two offices** in Poland and Moldova to support refugees.

In three years Project HOPE has:

Delivered essential pharmaceuticals, medical supplies and equipment worth over **\$15 million**



Operated **64** mobile medical units and incentivized staff at **40** health facilities, providing care to over **1 million** patients.

Trained nearly **12,000** health care workers in basic life support, mental health, and other skills



Reconstructed and repaired **16** health and social facilities, improving care for over **143,000** people for years to come.

Supplied **nine** ambulances to equip first responders with the tools they need to conduct over **23,000** patient transportations

Provided MHPSS services to more than **238,000** people at **eight** Project HOPE MHPSS Centers, **five** IDP centers, **41** Hospitals (in-person and virtually), and **18** mobile medical units

Refugee Response

Supporting Refugees and Host Communities in Moldova

With more than **135,000** Ukrainian refugees living in Moldova, in 2024 Project HOPE continued its efforts to strengthen local health systems in rural and under-resourced communities through the **Refugee Emergency Assistance and Community Health (REACH)** program, focusing on **three** key regions.

To ensure equitable access to health services, Project HOPE provided vehicles, essential pharmaceuticals, and medical supplies to equip providers with the tools they needed to establish **home-based care** services, including primary care and palliative care.

Project HOPE also conducted **specialized training sessions** for doctors and nurses to improve the quality of care by enhancing their skills in emergency care, home-based care, and mental health support.

In collaboration with The Moldova Project, a trusted local partner, Project HOPE supported the operation of **five safe spaces** providing **MHPSS services** and social integration activities to Ukrainian refugees and host community members.

Empowering Displaced Families and Local Communities in Poland

With nearly **1 million** Ukrainian refugees living in Poland, Project HOPE Polska launched the **"Bridges to Well-being: Empowering Refugees and Caregivers"** project to improve the well-being of refugees, foster social cohesion with local communities, cultivate supportive networks, and strengthen the capacity of local health care infrastructure.

Project HOPE Polska established **mobile MHPSS units** that support **six** refugee shelters by providing individual and group psychological counseling, recreation initiatives, and social cohesion activities.

The team also developed a new **Mind C.A.R.E. training program** for school nurses and caregivers to equip them with the necessary tools and knowledge to provide effective care and support, focusing on self-care, resilience, mental health assessment, and intervention skills.

Project HOPE has also supplied a local rehabilitation center and hospitals caring for refugees with **specialized medical, diagnostic, rehabilitation equipment, and furniture** to enhance available services for refugees and host community members.
