Strengthening

In the face of countless challenges, we were able to double down on our commitment to building healthier, more resilient communities.

Our reach grew and our presence deepened. With more of your trust, we stayed longer and showed up in bigger ways, working hand-in-hand with local health workers, government officials, and partners around the world. Together we strengthened local health systems and laid the foundation for sustained impact and lasting change.

That commitment was especially critical in places facing extraordinary challenges. In Gaza, ongoing war has displaced nearly the entire population, devastated the health system, and left families struggling to access food, water, and healthcare. Despite aid blockades and sectorwide cuts to humanitarian aid budgets, our health clinics continued acting as a lifeline for children facing starvation, women navigating pregnancy, and people with chronic illnesses. We kept distributing clean water to displacement camps, and we kept providing mental health support to families experiencing the trauma of war.

And in July 2025, when a deadly airstrike hit just outside one of our clinics in Deir al-Balah, our team members continued to show up and provide care. Their efforts made it possible to conduct over 349,000 primary health consultations, distribute 9.7 million liters of clean water, and provide more care and more malnutrition screenings for over 100,000 children over the course of the year. This work earned Dr. Mithqal Abutaha, Project HOPE's Program Manager, the 2025 Humanitarian of the Year award from InterAction.



Project HOPE's Gaza Program Manager, **Dr. Mithqal Abutaha, received InterAction's 2025 Humanitarian of the Year Award for his extraordinary leadership.** Even after the airstrike that killed 16 people outside one of our clinics, he guided the team to relocate within hours and kept delivering lifesaving care to malnourished children and pregnant women. Over the course of the year, Dr. Abutaha and his local Palestinian staff conducted over 10,000 medical consultations each week across seven clinics, sustaining high-quality care under the most extreme conditions.





As Ukraine entered its fourth year of full-scale war, Project HOPE continued to provide health and humanitarian support across the country. Despite a brutal winter and the constant threat of attacks, our team reached more than 1.2 million people through efforts that included rebuilding health infrastructure, deploying mobile medical units, donating ambulances, and expanding mental health services.

Since February 2022, millions of Ukrainians have been displaced within their own country, facing daily uncertainty, loss, and logistical strain. Through mental health and psychosocial support centers, Project HOPE helped families move beyond survival, offering group and individual counseling, safe spaces for children, and practical activities to help restore routine and dignity.

For Antonina, who fled Russian occupation in Kherson and resettled in Kyiv, a Project HOPE center became a place of healing — somewhere her children found comfort and creative expression in art classes, while she found connection and belonging in a women's group. Today she works as a social worker at the same center, helping others rebuild their lives and find their footing in a new and uncertain reality.



In Ethiopia, we expanded our health and nutritional footprint for people affected by civil conflict in hard-to-reach areas like Tigray, Amhara, and Afar. We met mothers where they already gather, from markets to churches, offering care and practical guidance on vaccines and nutrition. This support reached women like 19-year-old Tike, who is navigating motherhood after a divorce, and her mother, Lemlem, who is raising seven children on her own.

At the same time, we continued working in close partnership with the government of Ethiopia to strengthen global health security and national outbreak preparedness — efforts that helped the health system rapidly detect, respond to, and contain the Marburg virus outbreak in November.





MORE Response

Emergencies collided in 2025.

Devastating wildfires tore through Southern California, a deadly 7.7-magnitude earthquake struck Myanmar, and a catastrophic hurricane struck Jamaica. But when the calls for help came, we answered.

Because of you, we could respond in every direction, delivering urgent relief without hesitation. You made sure we could keep showing up, and we did, reaching more people affected by disasters and humanitarian crises than ever before.

In Los Angeles County, we supported more than 20,000 people affected by the Palisades and Eaton wildfires, which destroyed more than 16,000 structures and displaced tens of thousands of residents. As the fires burned, Project HOPE's Emergency Response Team — including local team members already rooted in the community — mobilized quickly, equipping free mobile medical units and distributing hygiene supplies to communities in need, air purifiers to people with cancer, and reentry kits to families returning to burn zones.

As the crisis unfolded, a critical priority came into focus: supporting the mental health of children and others impacted by the disaster. Through wellness kits designed for play therapy and the creation of safe spaces, we helped children — and the adults who care for them — begin to process the trauma. We also led trainings for social service organizations, hosted mental health sessions for older adults, and worked with schools to give teachers and young children the support they needed.

You trusted us to go further. In **Myanmar, where a devastating March earthquake compounded an already dire humanitarian crisis,** we worked alongside local partners to navigate access issues, conflict zones, and political complexities to deliver lifesaving care. Together, we provided more than 9,800 health consultations through mobile clinics, restoring access to essential health services for affected communities. We also distributed over 5,600 hygiene kits to help prevent the spread of waterborne diseases — delivering aid by boat to reach flooded communities — and installed two solar-powered water filtration systems that provided clean water to more than 22,000 people every week.

At the end of October, your continued support helped us mobilize a response to **Hurricane Melissa, the worst hurricane to ever make landfall in Jamaica and the second strongest in the Atlantic's recorded history.**

In the immediate weeks after the storm's destruction, we provided surge support to overwhelmed health facilities and led mental health and resilience trainings for frontline responders. At the request of local partners, we built and operated a field hospital outside Noel Holmes Hospital in Lucea to ensure access to lifesaving care. We also distributed critical relief items, trucking clean water to 133,000 people in St. Elizabeth, Westmoreland, and St. James parishes, where some communities went months without clean water.

We remained flexible and responsive as needs evolved in Jamaica. When an urgent call for help came, we moved overnight to deliver emergency shelter supplies via helicopter to Beeston Spring, a remote hilltop community where nearly every home was destroyed and families had been sleeping outside in the rain.

Thanks to your support, we made sure families weren't forgotten during life's hardest moments.

MORE Reach

The most lasting impact doesn't come from the outside. It comes from investing in the people and systems already at work within communities. By going local, we strengthen existing capacity and help create change that will stand the test of time.

In 2025, we began work in new countries and deepened our presence where needs evolved, equipping local health workers to address the unique challenges facing their communities across more than 30 countries and territories worldwide.



UNITED STATES

We expanded access to essential health services through free and charitable clinics in North Carolina, providing free breast cancer screenings that helped patients access early detection and treatment regardless of their ability to pay.



VENEZUELA

We helped ensure people could access quality healthcare in the face of prolonged crisis, supporting health workers as they provided primary care, maternal health services, and treatment for infectious diseases, chronic conditions, and other essential health needs.

POLAND

We deepened our work to provide mental health services for Ukrainian refugees, mental health training for school nurses, and language classes and other assistance so families could integrate into new communities and access essential services.



PHILIPPINES

We expanded nutrition support in Quezon City, equipping health workers with the tools they need to reach women and children and prevent premature births and nutritional deficits.



GHANA

We ramped up efforts to address the barriers keeping essential healthcare out of reach for mothers, newborns, and children by supporting health workers in local facilities and hospitals nationwide.



COLOMBIA

We responded to rising needs in Convención and Cúcuta by supporting health centers, delivering essential supplies, and helping fill critical gaps as violence displaced tens of thousands and strained local systems.



MORE Partnership

HOPE **Action** Network

Project HOPE launched the HOPE Action Network — a hub that empowers people to take timely, meaningful action on urgent health and humanitarian policy issues.

Members receive action alerts on legislation and budget decisions affecting global health and humanitarian programs, along with updates from Capitol Hill on key hearings, votes, and policy shifts. They also gain insights from Project HOPE’s Policy & Advocacy team, who are working to protect and expand U.S. investments in global well-being.

Whether you’re a seasoned advocate or just beginning to raise your voice, the HOPE Action Network makes it easy to stay informed and make a difference.

Africa Regional Emergency Response Network

Recognizing the urgent need for more agile and responsive emergency funding, we established the Africa Regional Emergency Response Network — a first-of-its-kind model backed by **Merck**.

This network is anchored by designated, flexible funds that allow local non-governmental organizations to act quickly when emergency strikes. In 2025, this Project HOPE network enabled our local partner, African Initiative for Relief and Development, to respond to an Ebola outbreak in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Thanks to this collaboration, local organizations in Africa have a trusted partner and immediate access to resources, ensuring that funds go where they are needed most.

Key collaborations

Across all operations, Project HOPE continued to partner closely with local health officials and governments to ensure that every investment in health and humanitarian response created sustainable change.

- In the Dominican Republic, we launched nurse training programs and the sixth edition of the Saving the Newborn program in La Romana in close coordination with the **National Health Service**, strengthening



emergency readiness at Hospital Dr. Francisco A. Gonzalvo and helping health workers deliver safer care for mothers and newborns.

- In Ghana, we partnered closely with the **Ghana Health Service** and other local partners to provide individual training and ongoing mentorship for health workers, strengthening the quality of care today while equipping the next generation with the support they need for tomorrow.
- We helped reopen the intensive care unit at **Hasbaya Governmental Hospital** in southern Lebanon, bringing together health officials, local health workers, and charitable partners. The intensive care unit had been closed for seven years, and its reopening ensured that thousands of people in Hasbaya and surrounding border communities could access lifesaving care.
- **SAMU First Response** remained an invaluable partner in emergency response, helping us build a field hospital outside Noel Holmes Hospital in Lucea, Jamaica, in the wake of Hurricane Melissa.



In 2025, *Health Affairs Publishing* advanced its mission of serving as a high-level, nonpartisan forum to promote analysis and discussion on improving health and healthcare, publishing journal articles, *Forefront* pieces, podcasts, events, and policy briefs, among other content. The journal featured two major theme issues, *Food, Nutrition, and Health* and *Insights About the Opioid Crisis*, and led timely editorial initiatives responding to a new U.S. administration, including the *Vital Directions* series and *Health Policy at a Crossroads*. The journal remained a top-ranked publication in the field, with an impact factor of 8.1.

Health Affairs Publishing expanded its role as a source of timely policy analysis, launching a new *Forefront* series on Medicaid financing and publishing work tied to the 60th anniversary of Medicare and Medicaid. The organization continued to emphasize accessible, “sensemaking” content that helps policymakers and stakeholders interpret complex issues.

Health Affairs Publishing also advanced its equity-focused work last year, launching the Community Voices initiative to highlight perspectives from community organizations and individuals working to improve health outcomes locally. The Health Equity Fellowship for Trainees program grew through increased publication output from fellows and ongoing support for early-career researchers.

Health Affairs Publishing’s work continued to inform policy discussions and shape decision making across government, research, and practice, reinforcing its role as a trusted source of evidence and analysis.

MORE Trust

All of our impact is a reflection of your trust. Our year of expansion would not have been possible without you. You trusted us to save lives and deliver hope, and that's what we did.

Together, we reached more people than ever before, training more health workers, screening more people for life-threatening diseases, and supporting more families affected by disasters and humanitarian crises.

More than 4.8 million people felt the impact of your generosity. Among the many milestones we achieved, your support helped us reach more than 3.3 million women, infants, and children facing urgent health and humanitarian needs — an investment that will shape healthier futures for generations to come.

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MORE Because of You

Strategic partnerships

More partnerships propelled us forward, helping us take bolder action and promote lasting improvements in healthcare.

- Through a partnership with **Labcorp** in North Carolina, we expanded access to free breast cancer screenings for patients who might otherwise have gone without care.
- Our partners at **Google** and **The Wonderful Company** donated their time and energy to help us pack wellness kits for kids impacted by wildfires in Los Angeles.
- Support from **The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints** enabled a range of critical programming, including strengthening nutrition for mothers and children in Ghana, increasing access to lifesaving care in Lebanon, and distributing medicines and essential hygiene supplies to internally displaced families in Colombia.
- The **Elsa and Peter Soderberg Charitable Foundation** made a three-year commitment to expand mental health support and resilience programming for refugees and host community members in Poland.
- The help of **dedicated fundraisers** like **Jodie Turner-Smith** and **Isaiah Sategna III** meant we could deliver more relief to Jamaica in the aftermath of Hurricane Melissa.

Brand collaborations

Our brand partners leaned in at pivotal moments last year, merging their passion with action to bring hope within reach for people across the globe.

- **FIGS**, the healthcare apparel brand, designed an “I heart LA” long-sleeve underscrub shirt and donated 100% of profits to our wildfire relief efforts in California.
- Author **Willow Winters** hosted a charitable auction, offering signed books, custom merchandise, and one-of-a-kind experiences to help us deliver more healthcare and hope. She also released a special edition of one of her books with a rewritten, hopeful ending, donating 100% of proceeds to Project HOPE.
- Streamers raised the bar, with **Chris Melberger’s “Rippin’ 4 Good”** campaign bringing in over \$135,000 at a critical moment for people in Los Angeles and children and families in Gaza and Ukraine.

Increasing giving

Our individual donors made a lasting difference, providing the support to help us meet urgent needs while investing in long-term health.

- A monthly gift means we’re ready before a crisis hits, not scrambling to catch up after it does. Our monthly donors, **HOPE Partners**, spread hope year-round and amplified their impact with matched funds and institutional support.
- In a year of unprecedented need, donors responded by putting their **donor-advised funds (DAFs)** to work. They recommended grants to keep clinics running, deliver lifesaving maternal care, and nourish children facing hunger. Many chose to set up recurring grants, turning a single action into ongoing impact.
- Legacy gifts go the distance. Members of the **Legacy of HOPE** society have included a gift to Project HOPE in their will or estate plan, demonstrating their commitment to provide people around the globe with HOPE for the future.
